

ensure adequate staffing to perform mandated services
and better protect public health and the environment.





EH Responsibilities: Land Use Team

- Permitting and inspection of septic systems
- Permitting and inspection of water wells
- Proof of Water review and approval
- Review of building permits
- Review of land division and boundary adjustment applications
- Review of Coastal Development permits and use permits
- Review of Environmental Impact reports
- Sample collection for state ocean water monitoring program
- Sample collection for state shellfish poisoning program
- Complaint response and resolution

EH Responsibilities: Hazardous Materials Team

- Hazardous material spill response
- Permitting and inspection of underground storage tanks
- Permitting and inspection of hazardous waste generators
- Registration, permitting and inspection of solid waste facilities
- Oversight of solid waste facility closure
- Permitting and inspection of underground tank removal
- Permitting and inspection of monitoring well construction
- Permitting and inspection of monitoring well removal
- Complaint response and resolution

EH Responsibilities: Consumer Protection Team

- Retail Food Facilities and Cottage Food Facilities
- Food Handler Education and Certification
- Community Events and Farmers' Markets
- **Body Art Facilities and Practitioners**
- **Organized Camps**
- Detention Facilities (County Jail and Juvenile Hall)
- State Small Water Systems (5 to 14 connections)
- Pools and spas
- Foodborne Illness Investigations
- Complaint response and resolution

Most EH Fees Fail to Meet Cost Recovery

Many EH fees were last adjusted in 2010, but failed to achieve 100% cost recovery at that time

Food Facilities – 83% unchanged since 2010

Domestic Water (wells) – 90% unchanged since 2010

Septic Systems – 93% unchanged since 2010

Land Use – 60% unchanged since 2010

The cost recovery gap has widened since 2010 due to higher operating costs

Methodology Behind the Calculations

Annual Salary
+ Benefits
+ Services & Supplies
+ A-87

= Weighted Hourly Rate (WHR)

WHR*Average Hours Spent on Fee Activity = Fee

The tool was developed by the Auditor's office, and is the same methodology used in the past for prior fee revisions.

Overview of this proposed fee adjustment

- 11 fees were eliminated.
- 13 fees were lowered due to increased efficiency of staff.
- Increases capped at 50%
- 28 fees were capped below actual costs in the following programs to lessen impact on regulated community:

Septic – 11 Domestic Wells – 6 Land Use/Planning – 3 Food – 6 Pools & Spas – 1 Solid Waste - 1

Cannabis related fees were left unchanged pending future changes to that program.
