Land Stewardship: Manage mitigation lands to protect native plants, enhance native habitats and support local grazing.







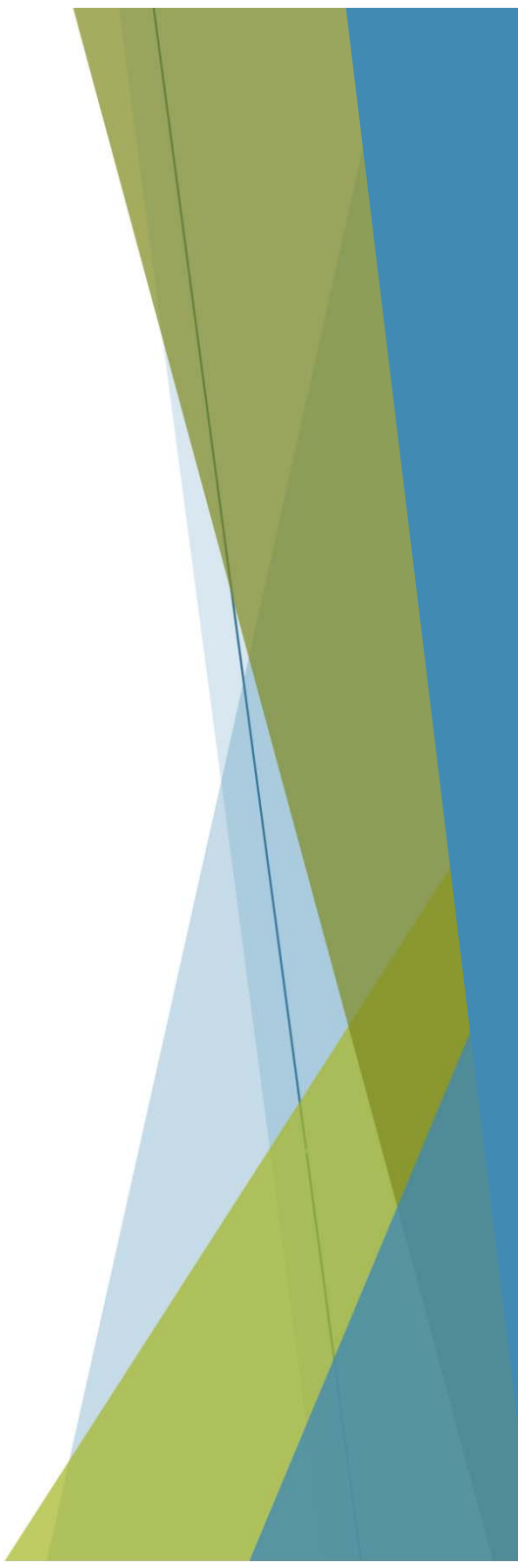

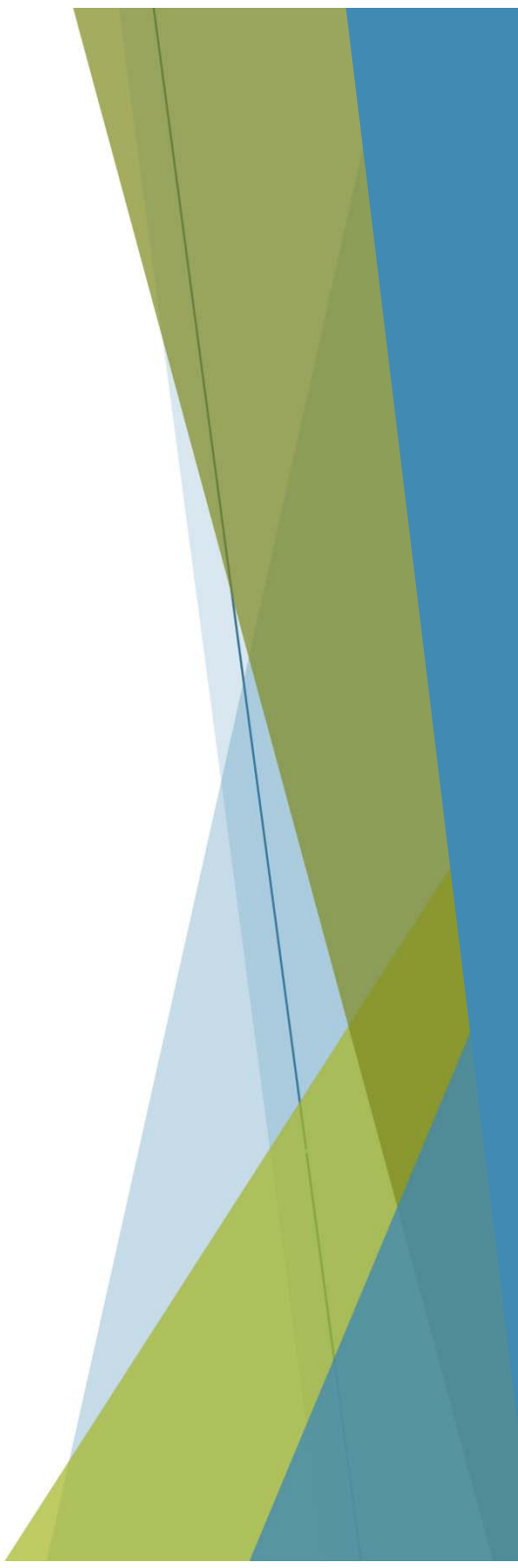

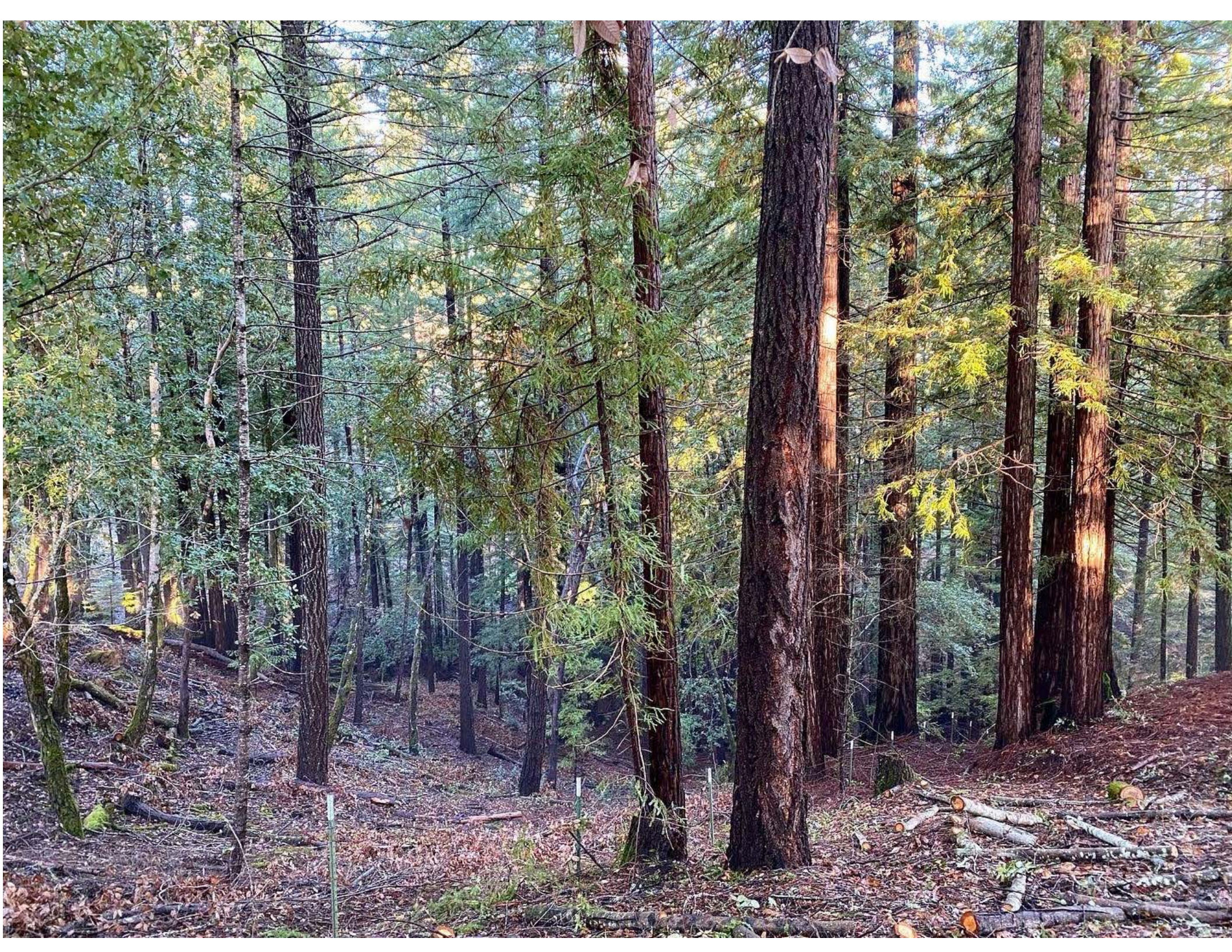
