1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The Mendocino County Health and Human Services Agency Community Health Education & Engagement Unit (CHEE) will act as a pass through for Walk Bike Mendocino to accomplish their goals. Mendocino County (pop. 87,192), located on California's northern coast, is the state's 15th largest county, covering an area of 3,500 square miles. Two-thirds of residents live in and around the small cities of Ukiah, Fort Bragg, and Willits while the remaining third live in small scattered communities throughout the county, resulting in a population density of only 25 persons/square mile compared with the statewide average density of 239 persons/square miles. County residents are predominantly white/non-Hispanic with large Hispanic (24%) and Native American Indian (6%) populations.

Among California's 58 counties, Mendocino County also has the fourth highest pedestrian killed or injured rate in the state and is in the highest (worst) quartile for pedestrians over 65 injured or killed. Among pedestrians under 15, rates of fatality and injury are relatively low. However, this is likely a reflection of low pedestrian rates. In the more rural areas of the County, long distances and the lack of sidewalks or shoulders on the road make walking or bicycling very difficult and uncommon. In the more densely populated cities many parents overestimate the risks and underestimate the benefits of walking and bicycling. For example, one local school actively discourages children from walking and biking to school out of fear for children's safety. This misplaced fear leads to increased traffic and congestion and increases the risk for all. Every car that is taken off the road is one less car that could hit a student.

For the past several years, and with OTS support (FY 13/14), CHEE has been working to advocate for and build more walkable and bikeable communities, and to create and disseminate effective promotional messages to encourage people to be more active. These efforts, many of which were in coordination with Walk & Bike Mendocino, have proven successful – more adults are riding bikes to in-town destinations and more students are biking or walking to school and other activities. An increase in mode share for bicyclists and walkers has been shown to correlate with improved safety for both drivers and vulnerable users.

Target Population:

The proposed project will be carried out primarily in the county's three largest and most densely populated communities—Fort Bragg, Ukiah, and Willits. These areas have a combined population of more than 60,000:

- Fort Bragg (95427 zip code, population 14,961)
- Ukiah (95482 zip code, population 31,802)
- Willits (95490 zip code, population 13,506)
- Walk & Bike Mendocino will work with school age children, their parents, and seniors throughout Mendocino County. Traffic safety data suggests that adults and senior pedestrians in Mendocino County are at high risk relative to the rest of the state. Additionally, recent Safe Routes to School work in Mendocino County has identified parent and adult fear (for their children) as a major barrier to increasing active transportation mode share, particularly at schools. This program will decrease fear as a barrier by providing empowerment through education regarding the positive benefit to risk ratio in opting for Active Transportation. In other words, the health benefits of walking and biking far exceed the risks, even more so when pedestrians and bicyclist employ safe traffic engagement strategies including remaining sober. The project goal is to decrease pedestrian and bicyclist collisions with an emphasis school age children, their parents, and senior safety and mobility.

Strategies:

- Walk & Bike Mendocino (WBM) will feature outreach and education efforts to school age children and seniors throughout Mendocino County to include school-based education, bike rodeos and community awareness events, walking school bus support, and walking safety tours for seniors.
- School Based Safety Education WBM will present pedestrian education in the classroom to second grade students. Bicycle education will be provided to fifth grade students in the classroom followed by on-the-bike education. WBM Staff will provide training materials and "train the trainer" guidance to teachers to increase sustainability.
- Bike Rodeos and Community Awareness Events WBM will attend community events to conduct community bike rodeos and outreach. A primary focus on these events will be to communicate to parents the

- positive health benefit to risk ratio of active transportation for their children while addressing safety concerns.
- Walking School Bus Support WBM staff will work with parents to choose the most appropriate remote drop off locations, provide crossing guard training and support, and provide support to parents in organizing and coordinating safe walking school busses.
- Safety Presentations and Walking Tours for Seniors WBM staff will present at Senior Centers and Health Centers to increase awareness of current best practices that can improve safety for seniors. WBM staff will conduct walking tour/audits with seniors to identify potential opportunities for improvement in their neighborhoods and provide information on how they can more effectively advocate for improved safety measures.
- The project goal is to decrease pedestrian and bicyclist collisions with an emphasis on senior citizen safety and mobility. School based education will work towards sustainability by preparing teachers to present the materials in the future while engaging parents as mentors and proponents for active transportation safety and sober driving.

2. PERFORMANCE MEASURES

A. Goals:

- 1. Reduce the number of persons killed in traffic collisions.
- 2. Reduce the number of persons injured in traffic collisions.
- 3. Reduce the number of pedestrians killed in traffic collisions.
- 4. Reduce the number of pedestrians injured in traffic collisions.
- 5. Reduce the number of bicyclists killed in traffic collisions.
- 6. Reduce the number of bicyclists injured in traffic collisions.
- 7. Reduce the occurrence of collisions involving senior citizens being hit by vehicles to zero from 3.
- 8. Reduce the number of pedestrian vs auto collisions resulting in injuries and fatalities 20% from 2015 levels from 30 to 24.
- 9. Reduce the number of bicycle vs auto collisions resulting in injuries and fatalities 20% from 2015 levels from 20 to 16.

3. METHOD OF PROCEDURE

A. Phase 1 - Program Preparation (1st Quarter of Grant Year)

Walk and Bike Mendocino

- Assign staff for coordination and youth activities and orient them to grant objectives.
- Purchase and/or allocate supplies and materials.
- Develop detailed implementation plan for countywide media campaign.
- Participate in quarterly Ukiah CHP Area Community Outreach Panel meetings.
- Finalize detailed data collection and reporting plan.
- Identify appropriate partner senior centers and care facilities to develop presentation schedules
- Research and prepare outreach/education materials to address senior traffic safety
- Identify appropriate elementary schools to develop presentation and outreach schedules

Media Requirements

• Issue a press release announcing the kick-off of the grant by November 15, but no earlier than October 1. If unable to meet the November 15 date, communicate reasons to your OTS Coordinator. The kick-off press releases and any related media advisories, alerts, and materials must be emailed for approval to the OTS Public Information Officer at pio@ots.ca.gov, and copied to your OTS Coordinator, 14 days prior to the issuance date of the release.

B. Phase 2 - Program Operations (Throughout Grant Year)

Walk and Bike Mendocino

- Participate in traffic safety fairs and/or community events with an effort to reach individuals. (Four Fairs or events)
- Conduct pedestrian and/or bicycle safety classroom presentations with an effort to reach students. (Pedestrian one day in class; and Bicycle Safety education two to four on the bike; to at least seven schools)
- Develop a pedestrian and/or bicycle safety program and materials to be adopted as an on-going program in schools with an effort to reach students. (Education to at least one teacher in seven different schools)
- Conduct Walking School Busses at schools with an effort to reach students. (Establish Walking School Busses for at least four schools with a parent education component)
- Conduct pedestrian Walking Field Trips with an effort to reach adults and senior citizens. Conduct community outreach events with an effort to reach adults and senior citizens. (six senior center/health center events)
- Collaborate with health care providers and/or senior citizen centers to promote pedestrian safety. Conduct pedestrian safety presentations with an effort to reach older adults. (Three health Center Presentations)

Media Requirements

- Submit all grant-related activity press releases, media advisories, and general public materials to the OTS Public Information Officer (PIO) at pio@ots.ca.gov, with a copy to your OTS Coordinator.
 - If an OTS template-based press release is used, the OTS PIO and Coordinator should be copied when the release is distributed to the press. If an OTS template is not used, or is substantially changed, a draft press release shall be sent to the OTS PIO for approval. Optimum lead time would be 10-20 days prior to the release date to ensure adequate turn-around time.
 - Press releases reporting the results of grant activities such as enforcement operations are exempt

- from the recommended advance approval process, but still should be copied to the OTS PIO and Coordinator when the release is distributed to the press.
- Activities such as warrant service operations and court stings that could be compromised by advanced publicity are exempt from pre-publicity, but are encouraged to offer embargoed media coverage and to report the results.
- Use the following standard language in all press, media, and printed materials: Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- Email the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> and copy your OTS Coordinator at least 30 days in advance, a short description of any significant grant-related traffic safety event or program so OTS has sufficient notice to arrange for attendance and/or participation in the event.
- Submit a draft or rough-cut of all printed or recorded material (brochures, posters, scripts, artwork, etc.) to the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> and copy your OTS Coordinator for approval 14 days prior to the production or duplication.
- Include the OTS logo, space permitting, on grant-funded print materials; consult your OTS Coordinator for specifics.
- Implement a public information and education campaign focused on prevention of drug-impaired driving and increased traffic safety, including at least 6 articles or do at least 6 interviews to be published in local newspapers and at least 6 PSA's on local radio stations.

C. Phase 3 - Data Collection & Reporting (Throughout Grant Year)

Quarterly Performance Reports (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)

- Collect and report quarterly, appropriate data that supports the progress of goals and objectives.
- Provide a brief list of activity conducted, procurement of grant-funded items, and significant media activities. Include status of grant-funded personnel, status of contracts, challenges, or special accomplishments.
- Provide a brief summary of quarterly accomplishments and explanations for objectives not completed or plans for upcoming activities.
- Collect, analyze and report statistical data relating to the grant goals and objectives.

4. METHOD OF EVALUATION

Using the data compiled during the grant, the Grant Director will complete the "Final Evaluation" section in the fourth/final Quarterly Performance Report (QPR). The Final Evaluation should provide a brief summary of the grant's accomplishments, challenges and significant activities. This narrative should also include whether goals and objectives were met, exceeded, or an explanation of why objectives were not completed.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

This program has full support of the County of Mendocino. Every effort will be made to continue the grant activities after grant conclusion.
