Dear Board of Supervisors:

The Mendocino County Fire Safe Council (MCFSC) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit with the mission to inform, empower, and mobilize County residents to survive and thrive in wildfire prone environments. We are the County's partner to ensure residents' preparedness. The MCFSC provides information, education, fire professional networks, and grant funding resources that enable neighborhoods to collectively act to protect people, property and the environment.

In fiscal year 2018, MCFSC leveraged \$25,000 from the County to make significant progress on the operations and services provided to county residents. County funding allowed the MCFSC to reorganize and improve our operations, increase our education and outreach, and support project planning and implementation. See our FY2018 Accomplishments on page 2.

For this upcoming fiscal year 2019, our budget request is \$100K in order to accommodate the increased demand in FSC services. (For example, 19 new FSCs are under development in the Anderson Valley area alone.) Our goal is to restructure the FSC to be able to support hundreds of FSCs, reaching all of Mendocino County residents, without increasing administrative costs, through literature, website automation, and a self-sustaining business strategy.

The MCFSC operates under the fiscal sponsorship of the Mendocino County Resource Conservation District (MCRCD). The MCRCD can no longer afford to subsidize the FSC, so we are developing strategies to enable the Fire Safe Council to regain its independence. We will have a long-term sustainment strategy in order to reliably provide continuous fire safety services to our County residents well into the future.

County based funding is necessary to begin these activities and all our plans align with County objectives and planning documents as shown by the MCFSC FY2019 Plans on page 3.


