BACKGROUND

Assemblymember Phil Ting (D-San Francisco) introduced AB 995: \$8 M augmentation to THP-Plus Assemblymember Laura Friedman (D-Glendale) introduced AB 531:

\$5 M housing navigation for youth entering/in Extended Foster Care

WHY EXPAND THE THP-PLUS BUDGET? 2018 DATA CONSIDERED IN PROPOSING 2019 LEGISLATION



During this same time, the budget for THP-Plus has remained unchanged

WHY EXPAND THE THP-PLUS BUDGET? 2018 DATA CONSIDERED IN PROPOSING 2019 LEGISLATION

- Over half of the THP-Plus programs (66%) that maintain a waiting list had youth waiting for housing.
- **417** youth and their **104** children were on waiting lists for THP-Plus as of 6/30/18.

WHAT WERE THE RESULTS OF AB 995 & AB 531 & THEIR COMPANION BUDGET PROPOSALS?

In final budget negotiations, Department of Finance would not allow additional state investment in programs that were part of 2011 Realignment.

Funding was redirected from Department of Social Services (DSS) to Department of Housing & Community Development (HCD) and language was generalized regarding program and target population.

2019-20 State budget included: \$8 M from the THP-Plus proposal and \$5 M from the housing navigation proposal

\$8 M FOR TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM—OVERVIEW

\$8 million annually for county child welfare agencies to help young adults age 18-25 secure and maintain housing, with priority given to young adults formerly in the state's foster care or probation systems.

- Funding administered by HCD.
- HCD required to consult with DSS, Department of Finance (DOF) & County Welfare Directors Association (CWDA) to develop an allocation schedule.
- Funding allocated to child welfare agencies.
- Funding subject to budget appropriation; intent of legislature to consider alternative solutions if funding suspended.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING: ELIGIBLE USES

Funds shall be used to help young adults who are 18 to 25 years of age secure and maintain housing. Use of funds may include, but are not limited to:

- 1) Identify and assist housing services for this population in your community;
- 2) Assist this population to secure and maintain housing (with priority given to those in the state's foster care or probation system);
- 3) Improve coordination of services and linkages to community resources within the child welfare system and the Homeless Continuum of Care; and
- 4) Provide engagement in outreach and targeting to serve those with the most severe needs.

\$8 M FOR TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM—BILL LANGUAGE

CHAPTER 11.7. Transitional Housing Program

50807. (a) Subject to an appropriation in the annual Budget Act, the Department of Housing and Community Development shall provide funding to counties for allocation to child welfare services agencies to help young adults who are 18 to 24 years of age secure and maintain housing, with priority given to young adults formerly in the state's foster care or probation systems.

(b) The department shall consult with the Department of Social Services, the Department of Finance, and the County Welfare Directors Association to develop an allocation schedule for purposes of distributing funds pursuant to subdivision (a) to counties.

(c) (1) The implementation of this chapter shall be suspended on December 31, 2021, unless paragraph (2) applies.

(2) If, in the determination of the Department of Finance, the estimates of General Fund revenues and expenditures determined pursuant to Section 12.5 of Article IV of the California Constitution that accompany the May Revision required to be released by May 14, 2021, pursuant to Section 13308 of the Government Code, contain projected annual General Fund revenues that exceed projected annual General Fund expenditures in the 2021–22 and 2022–23 fiscal years by the sum total of General Fund moneys appropriated for all programs subject to suspension on December 31, 2021, pursuant to the Budget Act of 2019 and the bills providing for appropriations related to the Budget Act of 2019 within the meaning of subdivision (e) of Section 12 of Article IV of the California Constitution, then the implementation of this chapter shall not be suspended pursuant to paragraph (1).

(3) If paragraph (1) applies, it is the intent of the Legislature to consider alternative solutions to facilitate the continued implementation of the program created pursuant to this chapter.

\$5 M FOR HOUSING NAVIGATION PROGRAM—OVERVIEW

\$5 million one-time funding for counties for the support of housing navigators to help young adults age 18-21 secure and maintain housing, with priority given to young adults in the foster care system.

- Funding administered by HCD.
- HCD may consult with DSS to develop an allocation schedule.
- Funds available for encumbrance or expenditure until June 30, 2022.

HOUSING NAVIGATION: ELIGIBLE USES

The HNP program funds housing navigators for county child welfare agencies. Housing navigator activities may include, but are not limited to:

- 1) Assist young adults aged 18-21 secure and maintain housing (with priority given to young adults in the state's foster care system);
- 2) Provide housing case management which include essential services in emergency supports to foster youth;
- 3) Prevent young adults from becoming homeless; and
- Improve coordination of services and linkages to key resources across the community including those from within the child welfare system and the local Continuum of Care.

BILL LANGUAGE: HOUSING NAVIGATION PROGRAM

2240-103-0001—For local assistance, Department of Housing and Community Development

The Department of Housing and Community Development may consult with the Department of Social Services to develop an allocation schedule for the purpose of distributing these funds to counties. These funds shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure until June 30, 2022.

HCD HAS RELEASED APPLICATION—MARCH 31ST DEADLINE

HCD notified all county child welfare directors on February 7, 2020 of the availability of this funding. Counties must accept their allocation amounts by March 31, 2020 to access the funding.

ALLOCATION METHODOLOGY USED

THP: \$8 million

- Distributed based on each county's
 - percentage of the total statewide weighted average of youth in foster care (age 19.5 and 20 years), and
 - homeless unaccompanied young adults (age 18 through 24)
- Counties with 0 eligible population not funded.

HNP: \$5 million

- Distributed based on each county's percentage of the total statewide number of 17 through 21 year-olds in foster care.
- Counties with 0 eligible population not funded.

IMMEDIATE NEXT STEPS

County Personnel:

Consider requesting an extension.

• Get your documents in by <u>March 31st</u>. (Apply for your county's full allocation).

Providers:

- Notify your county contacts about this funding application deadline—is this on their radar?
- **Discuss with county contacts** how your county's allocation can be utilized.
 - (i.e. expand capacity, enrich program supports, etc.)

HOW CAN NEW FUNDING EXPAND THP-PLUS?

Increase bed capacity

Increase monthly rate per youth to address higher housing costs and/or enhance services

Establish a parenting rate to account for higher cost of housing and services

Extend program length

For counties with smaller allocations,

- increase youth stipend
- add financial incentive for students (i.e. deeper rental subsidy)
- enhance housing navigation services for youth transitioning out of program
- other program enhancements within budget

HOW CAN HOUSING NAVIGATION ASSIST YOUTH IN SILPS?

- Identifying <u>supportive adults</u> that could provide housing as a SILP, and negotiating those arrangements;
- Assisting NMDs with identifying realistic, safe and stable <u>housing</u> options in the private market;
- Roommate matching;
- Cultivating <u>landlords</u> to increase the availability of housing;
- Assisting NMDs with <u>communicating</u> with landlords regarding leases and move-in arrangements; and
- Providing NMDs with <u>financial assistance</u> associated with identifying and securing housing and stabilizing in housing including security deposits, moving costs, utility set-up and basic furnishing.
