RE: Project Development Funding Request for FY 21-22

Dear Supervisors:

The Mendocino County Resource Conservation District (MCRCD) has partnered successfully with the County of Mendocino on a variety of natural resource projects over the last ten years. The MCRCD works to secure grant funding for the Forest Health, Soil Health and Agriculture, and Water Resource programs that we manage, securing over \$13.6M in competitive grants since 2010. As a Special District of the State, MCRCD is able to efficiently respond to natural resource needs within the County to address post-fire reforestation/revegetation, fire preparedness, climate resiliency due to increased drought and flood events, water conservation, and water quality protection. MCRCD, as a non-regulatory agency, holds a distinct role as a trusted partner to landowners and the public for provision of natural resources services and information.

We are pleased to report that in Fiscal Year 2020-2021, MCRCD secured over \$1.6M in competitive grant funds that benefited the County's economy, landowners, and the environment. Not only does MCRCD have a successful history of bringing in millions of dollars to the County, but the majority of this funding goes to on-the-ground implementation, supporting local contractors to address our local environmental challenges.

The upcoming fiscal year will present unique challenges and opportunities due to the enduring effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, wildfires, and drought. MCRCD is well situated to find and secure funding opportunities if we have the capacity to research and write grants. To that end, MCRCD is requesting \$45,000 from the County to ensure we have baseline funding to develop quality applications for grant funding and assist County residents with conservation stewardship projects in the next fiscal year. The table on the next page describes our alignment with County goals.

We look forward to our continued partnership with the County to conserve, protect, and restore wild and working landscapes to enhance the health of the water, soils, and forests in Mendocino County.
